What is Collins Children's Home?

Collins Children's Home (CCH) is a residential home for children between the ages of birth – 21 who have been abused, abandoned, neglected or are otherwise unable to live with their families. Our goal is the spiritual, intellectual, emotional, social and physical development of our children, and the eventual reunification with their natural families whenever possible.

How are children placed at Collins Children's Home?

There are two ways children come to live at Collins Home:

1. Through the Department of Social Services. These are children who have been removed from their home due to an unsafe environment and need to be temporarily placed outside the home while resources are put into place for the child/ren and family's specific needs.
2. Through Private Placements. Private placement allows children to be placed in the care of CCH while their parents/ guardians are going through a season of crisis. Private placement allows parents/ guardians to keep custody of the children and to stay in close contact with them with the expectation they will return to their care after the crisis is resolved. Examples of private placements include (but are not limited to):
 - Grandparents who have custody of their grandchild/ren, but are unable to care for them due to declining health, financial instability, etc.
 - A single parent caring for kids with no home, job, etc.
 - A parent(s) struggling with addiction needing to go to rehab.



How long can a child live at Collins Home?

Children placed at CCH can live with us as long as there is a need, whether 6 month or 6 years.

Who can be accepted into care?

Before a child enters our care, we meet with them, their parent(s) or guardian(s), social workers (if applicable) and any others involved to ensure we are the best place for the child. We can accept children from birth to age 21.

Who cannot be accepted into care?

We cannot accept children who need therapeutic or a higher level of care.

What does it cost to place my child with Collins Children's Homes?

It will cost your time and commitment to maintain a relationship with your child. Currently, gifts from churches, individuals, others and our fundraisers (BBQ, golf tournament, etc.) help cover the day-to-day costs of caring for the children who live with us.

What kind of care and services will my child receive?

- Medical, dental and vision care
- Food and clothing
- Anything needed for school, including tutoring and supplies
- Participation in school activities, including extracurricular activities
- Participation in church and community events
- Church attendance and daily devotions
- Counseling with a licensed therapist

Who has custody of the children?

For DSS Placements: DSS retains custody

For Private Placements: The parent(s) or guardian(s) retains custody

Both DSS & Private Placements sign entrustment papers to CCH to ensure each child receives the proper care and services as mentioned above.

The following are a few activities the children and staff have participated in since our last newsletter:

- June—The kids loved 'In His Wakes' lake day! Several of them were really excited to realize they could do things such as tubing, skiing, Zup boarding and wake boarding (Although they didn't think they would be able to)! We also said, "Goodbye" to Relief Mom, Katie Reams as she and her husband, Rev. Richard Reams left us to pastor a church in North Charleston, SC. Katie loved and cared for our children for almost 6 years. We miss them and pray for God's blessing on their family.
- July – Children and staff enjoyed our annual trip to the beach sponsored by Garden City Chapel. We visited the Aquarium, Water Park and ended our trip at the Carolina Opry. We always have such great times making memories with the children and the free ice-cream we get each day at the Sea Shack is a big hit. The girls' home went to Hazard Kentucky on a mission trip and worked hard each day on different projects like painting, picking up trash, helping with VBS, shopping for food for a local food pantry. Chase Todd Photography donated time on campus to take individual pictures of our kids, sibling shots and group pictures of their cottage family.
- August- We had our annual Back to School Party/Tutor Orientation. This is a time for new and seasoned tutors to get together to talk about the upcoming school year and to meet all the children. We had a delicious lunch and finished the afternoon with the children playing on a waterslide rental donated by Carolina Bounce.
- September – Once again we were fortunate to receive Clemson football tickets to see our Tigers play thanks to Dabo's All In Foundation. This is always a big day for our kids.
- October – A program called Connect Our Kids in partnership with Lowe's of Seneca blessed us with a refurbished playground. They repaired some older structures and purchased new equipment along with a rubberized mulch. The playground looks so much better and the children are enjoying the new swings and slides.
- November – We had our annual Thanksgiving Dinner where we invited families, tutors, caseworkers, etc. to join us for a full traditional Thanksgiving meal. We are very appreciative of our volunteers that helped out with the food and those that helped serve. We had a large attendance and hope even more can join us this year.
- December – The Christmas season was very busy, but exciting for the children and staff. We were beyond blessed with the out-pouring of love and donations we received this year. Secret Santas made it a very special Christmas for our kids! We attended our annual Lydia Group Christmas lunch at Pendleton First Baptist to start off the month. Children and staff had our annual CCH lunch hosted by Lighthouse Restaurant where Santa & Mrs. Clause stopped by to give gifts and candy canes. The Chickasaw Point Women's Club hosted a Christmas party serving hot chocolate and desserts. The children were all presented with a beautiful box full of gifts and stocking stuffer items. We hope this will become a tradition as well.
- January – We were thrilled to be the recipient of the \$2500 prize from the World of Energy Christmas Tree Contest. Thank you to everyone who voted for our tree sponsored and decorated by Cosmopolitan Woman's Club members. Those sweet ladies are so talented and dedicated to helping our kids.
- January—March—the kids have had a blast painting and working with clay at Walhalla Art Works sponsored by Brent Smith and friends at Total Comfort Solutions.
- March—We are gearing up for our annual Spring break camping trip to Oconee State Park. We are so thankful to OSP for helping us share the joys of camping with our kids.

Join us in being advocates for children

We all have a role to play in making sure our community is the best place for children and families to thrive

- There are simple actions each of us can take every day to help reduce family isolation and stress, which are two of the major risk factors of child abuse and neglect. Such actions include making yourself known to new neighbors and families, volunteering your time at pre- or post-school programs, or providing time for parents to have an occasional break from the rigors of parenthood.

Great childhoods, and healthy, productive futures, are undermined by Adverse Childhood Experiences

- ACEs include things like child abuse (including physical, sexual, and emotional), neglect, parental stress, divorce, parental unemployment, parental mental illness or addiction.
- Greater than one in four people have experienced at least one ACE, and one in eight have experienced at least four or more ACEs during their childhood. The greater number of ACEs increases the risk of long-term adverse consequences.
- Reducing ACEs leads to positive long-term outcomes for children and communities, including lowering risk for serious health complications and helping children grow into more prosperous and productive adults.

What you can do if you suspect a child is being harmed

- If you suspect a child is being harmed, reporting your suspicions may protect a child and get help for the family. Reports should be made to your local child protective services agency or police department.
